## Powered Leaf Blower Guidance TPG GN4.0

# NOTE: This guidance is specific to a Stihl SH86C regarding the machine however the usage guidance can be applied to any blower.

## Familiarising Yourself with the Leaf Blower

- 1. The leaf blower is light weight and simpler to operate.
- 2. It has a 2 stoke petrol engine and starts easily. If it doesn't start there is either no fuel, no spark or it's been flooded with excess fuel.
- 3. Only fill with petrol pre-mixed with 2 stroke oil at a ratio of 50:1. Petrol to oil.
- 4. There is no fuel cock but there is a clear primer bulb which must be full with fuel in order to start.
- 5. The engine is manually started using a recoil cord.
- 6. There is a manual choke used to start the engine with 3 positions: fully on, half on, off.
- 7. The throttle trigger is under the handle. A lever on the side of the handle which is used to stop the blower or hold the throttle open without the need to depress the throttle trigger.
- 8. The air intake is on the right side of the blower and this must not be obstructed.
- 9. Ear defenders, eye protection and gloves should be worn when using the blower.

## **Getting Started**

- 1. Set the machine on firm ground and check fuel level.
- 2. Only fill the tank with unleaded petrol mixed with 2 stroke oil in a ratio 50:1.
- 3. Depress the clear rubber fuel bulb until fuel with fuel and then no more than 3 more presses.
- 4. To start the engine from cold put the choke in the "fully on" position (turn anti-clock)
- 5. Do not touch the throttle trigger as setting the choke provides the correct amount of starting throttle.
- 6. Gently pull the recoil cord out until resistance is felt and then give a firm pull. It usually takes two or three attempts. Always return the handle fully and pull against resistance.
- 7. As soon as the engine runs, pull the throttle trigger slightly and this will disengage the choke but keep some throttle applied to keep the engine running.
- 8. Allow the engine to warm up for a minute before putting to work.

## To Blow

1. Ensure other Volunteers are well clear of the work area particularly in front of the blower as it will throw up stones and debris and it also has a high noise level.

- 2. Generally it is best to run the blower at full speed to effectively clear leaves however it may be helpful to reduce the power when collecting leaves into a pile to avoid them being dispersed. The side lever can be engaged to lock the trigger at full power. A single press of the throttle trigger releases the throttle lock.
- 3. Speed can also be adjusted by the throttle trigger.
- 4. If the blower is struggling check the intake grill for debris.

### To Stop

1. Depress the side lever until the engine stops.

#### Usage Suggestions

- 1. Don't try to shift too big a pile of leaves so work in sections creating piles which can be gathered later.
- 2. If clearing a path where the leaves can simply be blown away from the path then there is no need to create piles.
- 3. There are two basic techniques:
  - a. Sweeping: where you use the blower like a broom and sweep the leaves away from you
  - b. Arcing: Where you swing the blower from side-to-side to push the leaves away from you.

#### After Use

- 1. Clean off as much dirt as possible and wipe down with damp cloth.
- 2. Clear the inlet grill of any debris
